

Tribute to the Martyr Fr Stan Swamy

Fr Stan Swamy, S.J. was a committed and compassionate Jesuit who worked tirelessly for the rights of the tribal people of Jharkhand state. I met Fr. Stan for the first time in 1972 when I went to attend a camp in the district of Chaibasa in Jharkhand organized by him to help the tribal youth to be aware of their rights. All his life, he worked in Jharkhand. At 84 and unsteady on his feet because of Parkinson's disease, he was



implicated in the Bhima-Koregaon case in Maharashtra and jailed without any trial. Proper medical assistance was denied to him until the COVID-19 symptoms were very severe.

His death on July 5th symbolizes the unjust system prevailing in our country for challenging the oppressors and violators of human rights. He championed the noble ideals of compassion, justice and peace and sacrificed his life for the oppressed people of Jharkhand.

May his life and martyrdom inspire many more people to take up the cause of the poor and the oppressed.

The World Population Day is observed on July 11 every year with the objective of raising awareness of global population issues. It was established in 1989 by the Governing Council of the United Nations Development Programme. It was inspired by the public interest in Five Billion Day (11 July 1987) which was the approximate date on which the world population reached five billion. The main aim of the World Population Day is to increase people's awareness of various issues such as gender equality, poverty, maternal health and human rights. Every year, on the World population day, various events and activities like seminars, educational information sessions, and essay competitions are organized, mostly in schools and colleges, to draw the attention of people to the issues of the growing population. World Population Day 2020 focused on the health, economic and social challenges that people across the world faced during the COVID-19 pandemic. Its main theme was *How to safeguard the* health and rights of women and girls amid the COVID-19 pandemic. It was the 31st World Population Day. This year too, it has a similar theme: Health needs and vulnerabilities of women and girls during the pandemic. Many countries are expressing growing concern over changing fertility rates. It advises against reactionary policy responses which can be extremely harmful as they can violate rights, health, and choices. The agency emphasises that women must be empowered educationally, economically, and politically. Even though we are in the second year of the COVID-19 pandemic, let us hope that our health care system will not be compromised and the population will not be adversely affected.



INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR LOYOLA STUDENTS

Loyola School was at the forefront in implementing the unique Students Safety Personal Accident Insurance Policy in 2016 as per the recommendations of the PTA.

It ensures cashless insurance coverage for personal accidents happening to Loyola students. The insurance premium is fully borne by the school. Many students have already benefited from this scheme.

The details of the scheme are given below:

- 1. This insurance policy offers coverage of Loyola students' hospitalisation expenses due to accident, subject to a maximum of Rs.1, 00,000. Hospitalisation for 24 hours is required to avail oneself of this benefit.
- Outpatient benefit upto Rs. 5000 can be availed for minor injuries that do not require hospitalisation.
 The reimbursement claim may be made later by producing valid hospital bills.
- 3. Provisions for permanent or partial disabilities.
- 4. Claims for death due to accident.

How to claim?
