It was the final one in the series of sessions that 'explore' various career paths that are open to students. The panellists comprised highly acclaimed professionals like Joseph Markos, a Senior Advocate practising at the Kerala High Court and the Supreme Court as well with over 37 years of experience, Basant Balaji, Judge at the High Court of Kerala, and Nikhil Narendran a legal subject matter expert in technology, media and telecommunication who was selected as part of 40 under-40 lawyers in Asia by the Asia Business Law Journal in 2020. The session was moderated by another great Loyolite, Govind G. Nair, who is currently an Advocate at the High Court of Kerala. The co-moderator was Suryakanth Krishna Prasad of XI F who aspires to be a lawyer.

The panel addressed a wide range of queries covering topics such as why they chose the career, what a normal working day looked like for them, and the prospects of a career in law. They also addressed the various types of Law Colleges and the admission procedures, highlighting the different examinations such as CLAT and what those examinations tested. They also talked about the factors that affect remuneration as well as the importance of putting in the hours if one wants a fulfilling career in the field. They handled the Q&A session with finesse.

The session concluded with the panellists talking about how their experiences at Loyola set them up for success in their careers with all the panellists talking about how the public speaking opportunities provided to them by the school were invaluable in their success. The session was exciting, extremely informative and a fitting finale to the first series of *LOBA EXPLORE* programme.

As a twelfth grader at Loyola, I cannot put into words how useful these sessions have been for all of us at this crucial phase of our education. 




