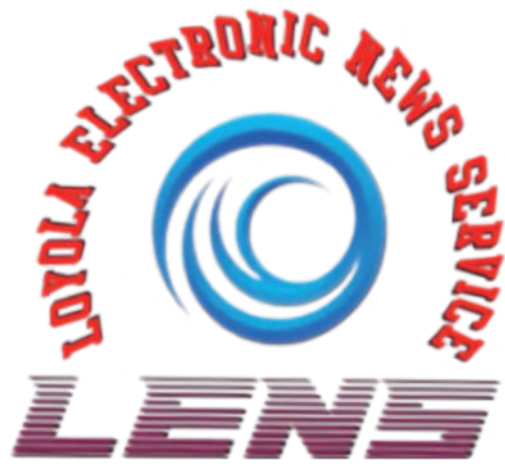

Thank you, one and all, for your laudable dedication and commitment.

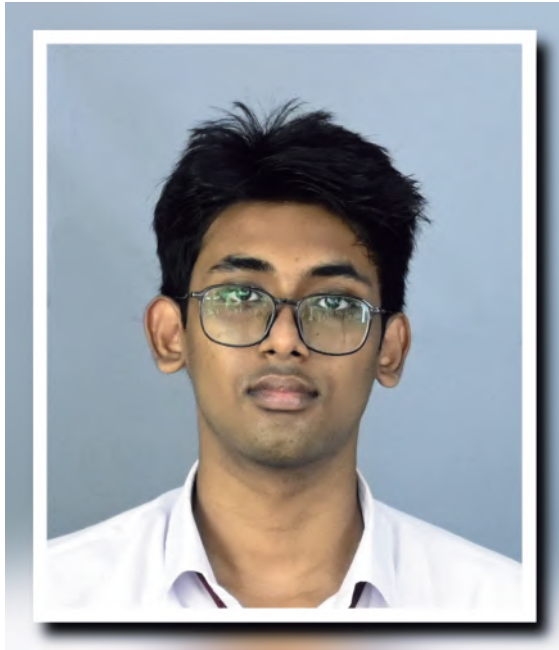

During his school days, he was an active participant in interschool cultural fests and a member of the organising committee of LA Fest. He did his BA in Economics at St. Xavier's College, Mumbai. In 2016 he cleared the UPSC Civil Services Examination and was allocated to the Indian Postal Service (IPoS).

Presently, Stefan works as the Assistant Director General in the Project Management Unit of the Department of Posts in New Delhi, where he is a part of the team tasked with the implementation of the Department's IT Modernization Project, which seeks to modernize more than 1.5 lakh post offices in India through the introduction of technology solutions. Prior to this, he was posted as the Senior Superintendent of Post Offices, Erode Division, wherein he was responsible for managing the operations of more than 300 post offices and 800 postal staff.

As an IPoS officer, he has always been enthused by the Department's wide array of services. 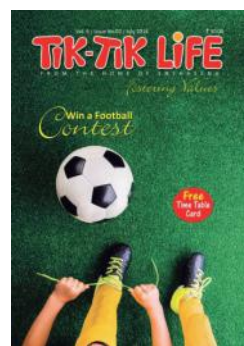
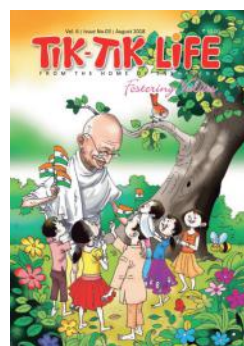
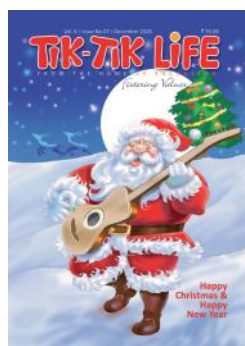
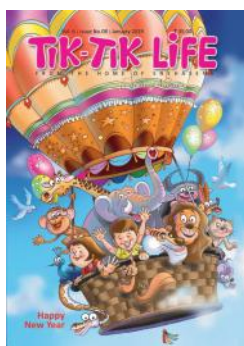
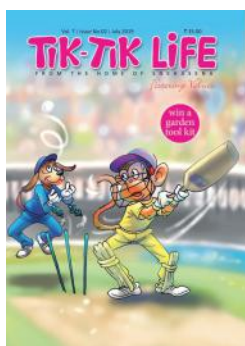
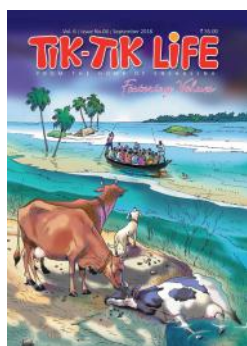


ABRAHAM PHILIP (65)

A Visit to JNTBGRI



The Biology batch of 2025 had the great opportunity to visit Jawaharlal Nehru Tropical Botanical Garden and Research Institute (JNTBGRI), Palode, Thiruvananthapuram, on 16 March 2024.

JNTBGRI is a renowned botanical garden and research institute devoted to the study and conservation of diverse tropical plants. Being one of the largest botanical gardens in Asia, it houses an impressive array of plant species.

JNTBGRI has several divisions like Palmetum, Bambusetum etc. We started our exploration by visiting Palmetum, one of the attractions of which is the great *gulubia costata*, the tallest palm species. Next, we visited the Aquatic Conservatory which showcases a diverse array of aquatic plants. The garden has a massive collection of 44 varieties of jasmine and a captivating lineup of orchids some of which bloom only once in two years. The garden's collection of a wide variety of gingers and cocoa is equally impressive.

We were later introduced to Itty Achudan Vaidyan's Herbal Garden. Itty Achudan was an Indian herbalist who shared traditional botanical knowledge for *Hortus Malabaricus*, the 17th-century botanical treatise in Latin documenting the varieties as well as the medicinal properties of the flora of the Malabar coast.

We were riveted by the unexpected sight of a snake gracefully slithering from the water into the land. Though we observed it from a safe distance, this encounter served as an eloquent reminder of the interconnectedness of all forms of life within the botanical realm.

Our visit to JNTBGRI was an unforgettable journey of discovery and enlightenment which left an indelible mark on our collective consciousness. Now we carry with us not only memories of the visit but also a renewed sense of responsibility to safeguard the rich diversity of life that grows within our tropical ecosystems.

CAMPUS HEROISM

CAUSE AND CURE

It is perhaps presumptuous to sit in judgement on the ways of the world and to make categorical statements. Still, most of us have had occasions to observe the aberrations of the adolescent and to have our own inferences, largely tentative. What follows is an attempt to articulate some of the commonly shared views.

Campus heroism is a strange sort of cowardice in disguise, an unconscious display of some deep-rooted frustration, a clownish declaration of cultural poverty or, at least, a damaging comment on family heritage. The erring heroes can nevertheless be redeemed if their friends and fans show the grace to be upright in their attitudes and responses. If this generalization does not carry conviction, it may be remembered that "All generalizations, including this, are wrong!"

Campus heroism assumes many ugly forms, ranging from ragging of a savage sort down to eve teasing of a sour kind. Reports, like the one from Pookode Veterinary College, indicate that ragging is still practised in isolated pockets of barbarity and that attempts are made in some places to hush up the mischief in order to protect the prophets of anarchy.

If these reports are any indication, the student community as a whole has no right to sit back in satisfaction and boast of being a civilized lot. Maybe the youngsters betray the beast in them when there is some laxity in enforcing rules. If so, the real guardians of decorum are the eagle-eyed authorities on the campus and the lathy-wielding policemen off campus. To be aristocratic at heart and to be frightened into decency are quite different. Could it be that what we call culture is just a thin coat of bright polish over thick layers of savagery and sadism?

Not quite. There is some room for hope. To be sure, not all students are savages in designer jeans. Only a handful of warped personalities indulge in tasteless pranks that guarantee disgrace for themselves and their ancestors. In fact ragging has disappeared from most campuses and what we see these days is nothing but tomfoolery of a double-distilled sort. Only a handful of students with very low self-esteem are the real culprits. This minuscule minority has a wrong perception of heroism and is excited when frenzied fans blurt out '*bravo bravo*' like rubber dolls. Perhaps they are not malicious criminals, but only latter-day Quixotes who mistake clownish antics for acts of bravery.

In a sense these deluded clowns deserve sympathetic understanding and effective treatment because they are sick souls in stout bodies, unsure of themselves, neck-deep in some vague despair. Though they may excel in entrance examinations or else procure admission on the strength of ancestral wealth, they are not intelligent enough to distinguish between wholesome praise and pseudo-admiration. Most often the miscreants are poor victims of parental failure. For having grown up in an ambience of family discord where mutual respect is a rarity, these sickly souls are unable to treat others with respect and as a result they become dismal failures in healthy human relationship. Failure generates further failure.

Most ailments have effective cures these days. The friends and fans of the painted hero can render him more useful service. If these Sancho Panzas have any genuine concern for the miserable hero, they should stop admiring him whenever he comes up with pseudo-heroic adventures or jokes in poor taste. In the absence of an appreciative audience, many of the campus clowns will stop making asses of themselves. It is therefore a great disservice to urge these poor morons into misadventures and then to excite them further with high decibel applause or even to give them a silent nod of approval. It is much worse to protect them when they are brought to book. After all, one does not help a patient by suppressing the symptoms or by smuggling him out of hospital. So, when the so-called friends and fans develop genuine honesty to themselves and to the hapless patient, campus heroes will be cured of much of their delusion.

The process of recovery will be complete when the convalescent is able to distinguish between nobility and vulgarity and also between respectful appreciation and left-handed compliments. Once the realization dawns on him, the reformed hero will grow sadder but wiser in his ways and richer in self-respect and social consciousness. Instead of being a disgusting pest on the campus and being lavishly cursed for it, the reclaimed hero will show respect to other people and their rights and thus endear himself to all people around. But this beautiful transformation will take place to everyone's advantage only if the fans sting them into the realization that cheap popularity has never been an ideal worthy of pursuit. And perhaps, the truly reformed hero will be much more charming and lovable than the hypocritical saint whose pretence breaks down on unguarded moments.
