

## INNOVATION, AI, AND CLIMATE ACTION: MY TAKEAWAYS FROM THE 1M1B SUMMIT 2025

I had the privilege of attending the 9th Annual 1M1B Impact Summit held at the United Nations Office in Geneva, Switzerland on November 7th and 8th, 2025. The theme of the summit was 'Powering the Future with Green Skills, AI, and Youth Climate Diplomacy—Ground-Up Action for 1.5°C'. The summit convened youth changemakers, global leaders, and policymakers to deliberate on sustainability, AI-driven innovation, and climate diplomacy. The event underscored the critical role of young people as active contributors to global climate action.

One of the key moments I witnessed was the launch of the Youth Climate Diplomacy Programme, aligned with the 1.5°C target under the Paris Agreement. This initiative, unveiled in the presence of Tatiana Valovaya, Director-General of UN Geneva, aims to equip youth to represent India at international climate forums. The 1M1B Impact Compendium 2025 was also released by H.E. Ambassador Clara Delgado Jesus.

Another significant moment for me at the summit was being present at the launch of the AI Curriculum Handbooks for Grades 11 & 12 and the Atal Tinkering Labs Sustainability Projects Cookbook for Grades 6–12. As I participated in this launch, I witnessed firsthand the excitement among educators and youth delegates, and I felt proud to be part of an initiative that will empower schools to drive sustainable innovation.

Throughout the summit, several high-level panel discussions featured experts from organisations such as the ILO, UNCTAD, WEF, WMO, National Geographic, and IATA. These sessions provided valuable insights into how green skills and AI are reshaping the future workforce and accelerating climate innovation.

A gala dinner was also part of the Summit, which provided an excellent platform for meaningful networking with global delegates, policymakers, and youth innovators. The evening offered valuable opportunities to exchange ideas, build connections, and engage in insightful conversations.
